Setting the stage for new transformational leadership

The Jacksonville

Public Education Fund served as a strong advocate in informing and engaging the community around the 2012 school board elections, and around the school board's search for and selection of Superintendent Nikolai P. Vitti. We wrote a white paper and solicited community feedback on the superintendent search, and built a coalition to conduct a voter education campaign around key issues in the school board election.





ONE by ONE priorities fuel unprecedented alignment

Following the ONE by ONE community conversations, more than 150 representative delegates distilled the conversation data into a Community Agreement with four key priorities. The priorities outlined by the community were incorporated into the **Duval County Public** Schools'Strategic Plan, representing unprecedented alignment of district and community priorities, which are: Great Educators & Leaders, Efficient & Effective Use of Resources, Develop the Whole Child, Caregiver &Community Involvement, and Policy & Political Reform.

Quality Education for All Fund announced

The Jacksonville **Public Education** Fund was named as the intermediary to help leverage this \$50 million investment in human capital, a partnership between the Community Foundation for Northeast Florida and DCPS to improve teaching and leadership in 36 historically lowperforming schools and influence systemic change over the long term.



Annual public opinion poll released

Keeping a finger on the pulse of the community is crucial, so the first Annual Public **Education Opinion** Poll was conducted in fall 2013. The data — which showed growing support for district initiatives and leadership has been used by media and in the annual ONE by **ONE Community** Progress Report.



Local best practices spreading nationally

The ONE by ONE approach has been adopted by communities including Newark and Baltimore. JPEF staff were invited to give presentations about local work nationally, including at Grantmakers for Education, SXSWedu and Yale University conferences.







ONE by ONE: Building a base of grassroots leaders

The ONE by ONE movement evolved into a new, ongoing form of community mobilization, attracting 400 people to what has become the annual ONE by ONE Convention more than twice the attendance in the first year and with greater diversity. The hundreds of ONE by ONE delegates who pledged to take action on the key priority areas continued to build their leadership and knowledge as they engaged throughout the year.

THROUGH COMMUNITY ACTION

Mobilizing the community to support high-quality public schools is a core function of the Jacksonville Public Education Fund. Whether it's recruiting new advocates to join the movement, or harnessing their passion to move public education forward by speaking at school board meetings and contacting legislators, ONE by ONE brings together people from all over the city and of every background to find common ground. Working together, they promote greater involvement by community, business, parent, faith and civic leaders and collectively turn aspirations into reality.

Powering Potential

THROUGH RESEARCH

Strong advocates are equipped with the best information, and that's why informing community members, decision-makers and leaders is such an important part of our work. Ensuring that public education data is easily understandable and accessible is crucial, so we invest in online tools to give parents and community members the power to search for information about public schools and see district-wide performance data to make better informed decisions for their child. Research briefs, white papers and interactive visualizations elevate and illuminate key issues — such as school accountability, school choice and college readiness — in public education for the public and policy makers alike.

In 2014, the ONE by ONE movement that grew so strong in 2013 continued to gain momentum. Due to demand, the ONE by ONE Convention became an annual event, and doubled in size. More than 400 diverse public education advocates attended, making 1,090 **pledges** to take action and sharing **1,300 posts** — or one every 17 seconds — to make #ONEbyONEjax trend on Twitter. Guided by the volunteer Community Advisory Team, ONE by ONE continues to be a groundbreaking initiative that constantly recruits more advocates for high-quality public education for all children. In quarterly gatherings, staff and volunteers create an environment where every conversation is inclusive, respectful and representative of the citizens from all over Jacksonville's diverse communities.

Looking back

O 2010

Held "Beyond the Movie" forum where more than 250 people discussed the movie "Waiting for Superman."

O 2011

Banded together with other local organizations for a community rally to raise awareness about a steep budget shortfall in Tallahassee that threatened to slash funding for the public school system.

Released first research in BRIEF looking at reading proficiency, which found that reading on or above grade level by the end of 3rd grade was critical for long-term success.

O 2012

ONE by ONE campaign concluded with approximately 1,700 conversation participants and a full analysis of community feedback.

Launched School Facts Jax, a tool on jaxpef.org to make school data more easily accessible.

O 2013

First ONE by ONE Convention held where delegates distilled community conversations into key priorities for public education.

O 2014

Distributed thousands of copies of two policy briefs, one on school grades and another on school choice.

Powering Potential

OF LEADERS AT EVERY LEVEL

Improving public education is a lot like remodeling a house — keeping the parts that work, updating what's outdated. A job like that requires skilled leaders at many levels, and that's why the Jacksonville Public Education Fund sees visionary leadership as a key lever of change. What does it look like to foster leadership at all levels? It means highlighting, elevating and empowering Duval County's most exceptional educators through the EDDY Awards, which has grown from a single night teacher of the year ceremony into a yearlong initiative. It means educating the community

about the importance of school board elections. It means populating our half-dozen advisory groups and committees with the best civic, grassroots, education and business leaders. And it means advocating from the statehouse to the classroom around key issues facing students. We know the role leadership plays in public education — and work to give leaders and community members what they need to make sure our schools have visionary leaders. The results? Polling showing a 31 percentage point increase in perceptions of school district leadership since 2011.

In the classroom: The EDDY Awards

Identifying, celebrating and elevating the voices of Duval County's best educators is the goal of the EDDY Awards. In addition to the nearly 1,000 people who regularly attend the EDDYs to crown the annual Florida Blue Duval County Teacher of the Year, the initiative shares the best practices

of great teachers, grants them funds to improve their school and highlights classroom innovation.

At the district: The Strategic Data Project

Fellows from the Jacksonville Public Education Fund and Duval County Public Schools are participating in Harvard University's Strategic Data Project, which promises to strengthen the proactive use of student and teacher data in the district to ensure that all children receive a high-quality public education. Not only does it expose local staff to national leaders and best practices, the fellows' project is focused on matching student needs with teacher strengths to keep students from getting off track in the early grades.

Collaborated to produce Mayoral Candidate Forum on education and advocated for Mayor's Education Commissioner position.

O 2011

Co-funded with DCPS a study on resource use by Education Resources Strategies.

O 2012

School Board 2012 coalition formed to raise awareness about four active school board races.

Conducted research and solicited community feedback about Duval County Public Schools' superintendent search.

O 2013

Duval County School Board adopted new strategic plan based in part on ONE by ONE community priorities; first co-created plan for public education.

O 2014

19 organizations joined the School Board 2014 coalition.

The Jacksonville Public Education Fund believes in the power of collaboration and the alignment of shared goals to ensure success. Through numerous partnerships and efforts, our focus continues to be centered on the five priorities developed by the community and district.

COLLABORATION BUILDS VISIBILITY FOR SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS

Few elected offices are as important as school board members, but too often, voters either don't know enough about their choices or don't understand the significance of the election. That's why every two years, the Jacksonville Public Education Fund convenes a nonpartisan coalition

of nonprofit organizations to identify the most vital issues in the election and increase awareness among voters of the candidates running for School Board. The collaboration began in 2010 to offer voter education and outreach activities — primarily a candidate questionnaire and candidate forums

for each open school board seat.
The collaboration expanded in 2012 and 2014, with the addition of many more organizations for a total of 19 organizations, ranging from the NAACP to Beaches Watch to the United Way of Northeast Florida — a diverse group that came to consensus around the key issues.

Looking back

O 2010

Shortly following its creation, the Jacksonville Public Education Fund took over facilitation of the Learning to Finish collaborative, a coalition of organizations working together to increase the graduation rate.

O 2012

The Learning to Finish collaborative produces a five-year report of accomplishments, including an 11 percent increase in the graduation rate over that time period.

O 2013

JPEF, WJCT and DCPS partner with dozens of child-serving organizations

for the new P.E.P. Rally for Excellence, an end-of-year celebration of student success.

JPEF, DCPS join together to partner with Harvard University's Strategic Data Project, a Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation-supported program to transform the use of data in public education to improve student achievement.

GUIDING QUALITY EDUCATION FOR ALL FUND INVESTMENTS WITH TECHNICAL EXPERTISE

From the moment it was announced in 2013, the Quality Education for All Fund, a \$50 million private investment in improving public education, has been breaking new ground. Its scale is unprecedented in this community, and it is gaining attention from national groups thanks to its envelope-pushing

investments that are grounded in research and supported by community engagement. The Quality Education for All Fund, housed at The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida, is a collaboration with Duval County Public Schools, with the Jacksonville Public Education Fund managing

the grants to ensure high-fidelity implementation and evaluation. In 2014, the initiative was highlighted at the national Grantmakers for Education conference, and featured in an Associated Press story that ran in newspapers across the country.

Powering Potential

THROUGH INVESTMENT

Whether leveraging our expertise to ensure large-scale philanthropic investment is money well-spent to investing in micro-change at the classroom level, the Jacksonville Public Education Fund believes that private dollars should seed systemic change — not simply replace public dollars.

We also know that money alone isn't enough to improve public education. We make strategic investment successful by drawing on all of our capacities, whether it's research on best practices, community engagement expertise, or communications to advocate for change.

O 2010

Initial investment of \$150,000 in innovative Schools for the Future model for overage students.

O 2011

Schools for the Future opens at the Bridge of Northeast Florida.

O 2012

New federal bond investment for Duval County Public Schools

makes technology available to low-income schools thanks to a 50:1 donation match made possible by JPEF donors.

O 2013

Schools for the Future model, renamed Bridge to Success, expanded to multiple sites due to success in helping atrisk students graduate. Initial investment leveraged 80:1.

PowerUP Jax crowdfunding

portal, sponsored by the Community First Cares Foundation, launched to empower and highlight innovation among Duval County public school teachers.

O 2014

QEA Fund investments get under way; including unprecedented performance pay for teachers in QEA schools and new training programs for new teachers and school leaders.
