On behalf of the Board of Directors and staff of the Jacksonville Public Education Fund, we want to extend our deep gratitude for your commitment to public education and for serving as a ONE by ONE Delegate.

Nearly five years ago, the Jacksonville Public Education Fund kicked off the ONE by ONE Community Conversations to create a common vision for public schools in Duval County. # **LOGISTICS AND DETAILS**

### Location

The ONE by ONE Convention is being held at the beautiful Omni Jacksonville Hotel, located at 245 Water Street, Jacksonville, FL 32202. All activities take place on the 2nd floor which is accessible via stairs or elevator.

# **Parking**

Complimentary parking is available for all attendees in the One Enterprise Center - LAZ Parking Garage Tower or in the PWC Parking Garage. The LAZ Parking Garage Tower can best be entered from Water or Pearl Street. For the PWC Parking Garage, enter on Hogan Street. The garage contact number is 904.355.5129.

Parking Instructions:

- 1. Upon arrival, push the button and take a ticket to enter. Please <u>SAVE</u> the ticket as you'll need it when departing.
- 2. Find a space. Do <u>not park in reserved spaces</u> as unauthorized vehicles are subject to towing at owner's expense. JPEF is not responsible for vehicles parked illegally.
- 3. Take the elevator or stairs to the 2nd floor to the JPEF Registration Desk where you'll check in and also receive an Exit Payment Ticket.
- 4. To exit the garage, place the original entrance ticket in first, then place in your parking garage payment exit ticket. The gate will open. If you experience any difficulty, press the button for assistance or call 904.355.5129.






# 2017 EDUCATION PERCEPTIONS POLL


# Parents rate their own schools and teachers highly.




# Similarly, perceptions of teacher effectiveness steadily increase with firsthand experience

# STUDENT VOICE TOOLKIT

# Your guide for activating local students!

If your goal is to elevate student voice in any community or school project. Here are some critical recommendations:

# **Before the event:**

- Partner with existing organizations and schools who work daily with students. They can provide critical insights regarding the best ways to engage them.
- Make sure you get all required permissions for students to participate (media releases, parents' permissions, teachers, principals, etc.)
- Take into consideration the school calendar before scheduling your event. Try your best to accommodate your target students, understanding that there will never be a "perfect" time for any event.
- Be intentional about including diverse student voices, which often times means that you have to go the extra mile to ensure their participation (i.e. transportation, prepping, etc.). If you want to hear from a truly representative pool of students, you should be willing to make accommodations and put in the effort.
- Transportation tends to be a barrier when working with students, but providing it doesn't guarantee they will be able to attend an event. However, coordinating with an adult at the school or organization increases the likelihood that you will get the student participation you need. It usually takes until the very last minute to get students' participation confirmed, therefore transportation will be the last thing you can confirm.
- Providing food is essential when you are aiming to work with students. Be sure to order enough food for the students to be satisfied, eat seconds, and feel alert enough to contribute to the discussion.
- Train the adults, especially facilitators, on how to listen to student voices. It's challenging for adults to relinquish

authority in the presence of young people. **The** facilitators have to be trained to listen with an open mind to students without injecting their own opinions.

# **During the event:**

- Allow students to sit where they feel comfortable.
   Asking students to split their groups can ruin their level of engagement. However, you want to make sure that diversity, in as many aspects as possible (ethnicity, language, religion, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status) is represented. Trying to find a delicate balance can be challenging, but worth it!
- **Create a positive space** for students to feel comfortable voicing their opinions. You want to hear from all the students at the table and give them an opportunity to express their opinions.
- Make sure that everyone participates during the conversation and no one dominates it. Some people are naturally outgoing and feel more at ease sharing in group setting than others. Be sure to engage those who may be less inclined to share.
- Remind all participants that there are no right answers, and each person is free to express their views without being judged or rejected. Keep an open mind, listen carefully and honor differences in viewpoints and opinions.

# After the event:

 Invite students to be part of the team analyzing the results of the conversation, and allow them to propose and take action on their own solutions for the issues they are facing.

# Change starts with a conversation. 490 attendees

across Westside/Downtown, Northside and Southside/Beaches areas of town joined regional Task Forces to identify common themes that school and community partners can use to guide their own Student Voice work.

# Four themes were identified.

# #1: Character Development

#### Ideas included:

- Being mentally stable and motivated
- Having a vision and developing a purpose
- Utilize your resources
- Surrounding myself with others who motivate me
- Responsibility

# #2: Community Partnerships

#### Ideas included:

- Every student needs an adult support mentor
- Community study areas especially in businesses
- · Upkeep of neighborhood
- Platform for corporations to engage
- 26-29 age group acting as connectors
- Support a local school with our businesses
- More after school/community clubs

# #3: Real Life Work Experience

#### Ideas included:

- Career Day/speaker series with community leaders
- Work-study, internships, apprenticeships and job shadowing
- Integration point with other programs; i.e. Student Life Style Successes (funded by VyStar), Hero Points and Maker Marks, Big Brothers, Big Sisters: Beyond Schools Walls
- STEM for women

# #4: Amplify Student Voices

#### Ideas included:

- Develop pathway/tool for student representation and training on SACs, what to expect, and the importance of getting involved
- Support parental engagement
- Provide monthly forums where students talk about their concerns
- Represent student voices on organizational boards
- Hear from students with the most challenges
- Include student voices on decision-making bodies
